Twenty Years Ago

Twenty years ago the leadership of the Ludhiana Christian Medical College Board USA was handed from Rev. Charles Reynolds to Rev. Roberta Jones. We celebrate the 17 years that Roberta served as Executive Director of the US Board. She took over as CMC continued to transition from foreign missionary leadership to Indian national leadership. In the past

there were between 20 to 30 missionaries serving on campus at a time. During the later part of Roberta's tenure, Dr. Betty Cowan, the last remaining missionary, retired and returned to her home country. Roberta also served during the years when CMC was in crisis mode when the US CMC Alumni stepped up to help their alma mater survive. Over three years the US Alumni contributed half a million dollars. Along with church funds and money raised through efforts of other overseas partners, the institution survived and has become strong again. Today, out of the 400 medical colleges in India it is rated among the top 15. Roberta also saw to the completion of the main hospital building paid for with funds from ASHA (American Schools and Hospitals Abroad). The plague at the front door of the main entrance to the hospital reads, "The people of American have given to the people of India for the glory of God, this building. Inaugurated on October 28, 1999. ASHA Grant 712" Now in retirement Roberta continues to serve as a consultant on the US CMC Board. Thank you, Roberta, for your many years of faithful service.

CMC Reaches Out to Nepal



On April 25th, 2015, a devastating earthquake measuring 8.1 on the Richter scale struck Nepal. The epicenter was 90 miles from the capital city of Kathmandu in the small town of Gorkha. The loss of lives, homes and livelihood was great. The approximate numbers were 8000 killed and over 20,000 injured.

On April 27th Dr. Abraham Thomas, Director of the Ludhiana Christian Medical College, assembled an emergency medical team. The next morning after prayers and blessings were offered, the CMC team departed on their 800 mile trip to Nepal.

Dr. Samuel, an orthopedic surgeon, served as the team leader. Rounding out the team was Dr. Abhishek Sebastian, anesthesiologist, Dr. Ashwin Sakharia, maxillofacial surgeon, and Dr. Ajay Alex, resident, orthopedics.



With major highways in Nepal destroyed, their main obstacle was getting to the people who needed them. By operating in several different locations they were able to perform the needed surgeries and give earthquake survivors hope for the future.

The CMC doctors noted how the news spread rapidly that a team from the Ludhiana Christian Medical College had come to serve. Patients expressed their deep appreciation through their big smiles and words of gratitude.



Doors opened three months ago with 40 outpatients per day, and that number has already grown to 90 per day. This CMC enterprise is currently self-supporting and will remain so.
